

## **Philippines: Tubbataha**

#### Pickhandle Barracuda (Sphyraena jello) - Barracuda

Up to 4.5 feet. Silvery with **yellowish** tail and wavy bars on the side of body. Tail color distinguishes it from similarly looking Blackfin Barracuda. Think of the yellow tail as the handle of the pick. Often in large schools, mixed with other species of barracuda.

Up to 4.5 feet. Silvery with **dark borders on tail**, often tail is all black. Elongated body with up to 22 wavy bars on body. Often in large schools, mixed with other species of barracuda.

#### Great Barracuda (Sphyraena barracuda) - Barracuda

Up to 5.5ft. Elongated silvery body with **large black blotches** along body and fin lobes. Typically seen solitary or in small groups. Circumtropical.

Up to 16". Much smaller than the previous species. Typically seen in large schools. **Two dark stripes run the length of the body** and tail yellowish. Sometimes has a series of dark bars along back.


# Narrow-barred Spanish Mackerel (*Scomberomorus commerson*) - Tunas & Mackerel

Up to 8 feet. Typically pelagic, but occasionally comes in over reefs to hunt. Long, **slender body** with finlets. Has **numerous thin wavy bars** on side of body. Photo by James D. Watt/SeaPics.com.

#### Dogtooth Tuna (Gymnosarda unicolor) - Tunas & Mackerel

Up to 7 feet. Most common tuna on reefs. Stocky body with finlets. **Pale tips on rear of dorsal and anal** fins. Typically solitary or few.

#### Bigeye Trevally (Caranx sexfasciatus) - Jack

Up to 2.5 feet. Silvery, large-bodied jack. Distinguished by a black spot on the upper end of gill cover and white tip on end of dorsal fin. Can be seen in large schools. Males are black when courting. Western and Eastern Pacific and Sea of Cortez.

#### Bluefin Trevally (Caranx melampygus) - Jack

Up to 3.5 feet. Most common jack seen on reefs. Silvery iridescent with blue to green spots on upper two-thirds of body. Bluish hue to fins. Often seen nuclear hunting with other predators. Found throughout Indo-Pacific and Hawaii. Photo by: Bill Stohler.

#### Giant Trevally (Caranx ignobilis) - Jack

Up to 5.5 ft. Large, silvery jack. Scattered black speckles on sides and diffuse black area above pectoral fin. Distinguished by **size and steep forehead profile**. Typically solitary.

#### Redtooth Triggerfish (Odonus niger) - Triggerfish

Up to 16". Dark blue to purple body with pale blue head. Red teeth are sometimes visible. Seen up in water column in large, plankton-feeding schools, dart down on reef when threatened.

### Black-backed Butterflyfish (*Chaetodon melannotus*) - Butterflyfish

Up to 6". Black diagonal bands and black along back, **black saddle on base of tail**. Photo by Florent Charpin.

#### Spot-tail Butterflyfish (Chaetodon ocellicaudus) - Butterflyfish

Up to 5.5". Black diagonal bands. Distinguished from Black-backed Butterfly by shape of mark on tail. Spot-tail Butterflyfish has a **distinct black spot on base of tail** (vs. saddle).

#### Pearl-scaled Angelfish (Centropyge vroliki) - Angelfish

Up to 4.5". Pale gray (pearly white) fore-body, graduating to **solid black back half**. **Blue fin margins**.

#### Diagonal-banded Sweetlips (Plectorhinchus lineatus) - Grunt

Up to 20". Distinguished from other sweetlips by **diagonal black bands.** Yellow lips and yellow fins with black spots. White belly. Photo courtesy of Wikimedia.

Many-spotted Sweetlips (Plectorhinchus chaetodonoides) - Grunt

Up to 20". Body is **covered in dark brown spots on head, body, and fins**. Belly is whitish.

Up to 7 feet. Distinguished by **broad black margin on tail**. Second dorsal, anal fin, and underside of pectoral fins are black.

Up to 5.5 feet. Common shark found on reefs throughout west Pacific and Hawaii. Often seen resting on bottom in small groups. Distinguished by **white tips on first dorsal fin and top of tail fin**.
