

4. <u>Advanced Assessment Team Works in Biscayne National Park</u> - REEF adds 47 species to Biscayne National Park cryptic reef fish inventory (and we are only half-way done!)

In August of 2005, a week-long cryptic reef fish survey (cryptic fishes are those that tend to be more "reclusive" than more "openly" seen species), sponsored by the National Park Service South Florida and Caribbean Inventory and Monitoring Network, was conducted in Biscayne National Park, south of Miami, Florida. This was the second of four planned surveys in the project. Seven Advanced Assessment Team members took part in this round, surveying 42 sites in the park, across 9 different reef habitats.

To date, REEF surveys have added 47 new species to the park fish inventory list and gathered population and distribution information on 236 of the 368 species in the Park's master species list. Interesting finds have included the marbled blenny, spottail goby, black brotula, and spotted dragonet. The remaining two rounds of surveys will take place in the spring and fall of 2006. Stay tuned for more exciting information on this National Park Service partnership.

5. **REEF Survey Tutorials Online** - Inspired by one of our terrific volunteers, Liz Foote of Project S.E.A.-Link in Maui, Hawaii, REEF has developed an online tutorial designed to help you with conducting REEF Marine Life Surveys. Liz developed the original concept and put together a terrific resource for Hawaii surveyors. With the help of some of our interns, we took Liz's good idea and adapted it to apply to all of our survey regions.

The tutorial is loaded with tips, ideas, and helpful hints on how to conduct surveys, learn more about the marine life you encounter, and to help you have more fun!
